As the world's oldest and largest grassroots environmental organization, the Club's 1.3 members and supporters, in 65 chapters and over 400 local groups nationwide, possess the unique ability to empower people and influence public policy through community activism, public education, outreach and litigation.

The purpose of the Sierra Club's legislative scorecard is to assist the public in selecting their state legislators. The scored votes reflect the broad range of interests of Sierra Club members and volunteer leaders, and were chosen for their impact on Minnesota's environment and natural resources. The public should be aware that legislative scores are only one factor in choosing legislators who will work to protect Minnesota's environment. Other factors, such as bills authored, committee leadership, service on environment caucuses, and performance in floor debates contribute to a legislator's "environmental record." # SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

## 1. Nuclear Moratorium Repeal

In 1994, Minnesota passed a moratorium on the construction of new nuclear reactors. At that time, the Legislature cited unresolved issues related to the storage and disposal of nuclear waste, citing for new plants, transportation of hazardous waste, security and safety concerns, and high capital costs as reasons supporting this decision. Sixteen years later, the same issues remain unresolved in Minnesota and around the country. Yet some legislators still felt compelled in both 2009 and 2010 to pursue a repeal of Minnesota's longstanding moratorium law. The 2009 repeal attempt was offered by Senator Steve Dille as an amendment to the omnibus energy policy bill that was being carried by Senator Yvonne Prettner-Solon. A vote in the negative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The amendment passed 42-24. (SF550, 04/02/2009)

## 2. Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) Reduction Goal

The key goal underlying the 2009 Building Sensible Communities legislation was a comprehensive reduction in vehicle miles traveled (VMT) throughout Minnesota. The 2009 transportation policy omnibus bill, authored by Senator Steve Murphy, included policy language to include VMT reduction as one of MNDOT's agency goals. Senator Julianne Ortman introduced an amendment on the Senate floor to remove the VMT reduction goal from the bill. A vote in the negative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The amendment failed 15-45 (HF928, 05/08/2009)

## 3. ARRA Appropriations

Early in 2009, President Obama signed the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act into law. This law included, among many other items, significant investments in energy projects and energy infrastructure. Minnesota received approximately \$300 million of this money, much of which was directed to low-income weatherization projects and other State Energy Program projects. The appropriations bill for this money was introduced by Senator Ellen Anderson. A vote in the affirmative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The bill passed 48-12. (SF657, 04/24/2009)

## 4. Carbon Plan Requirement for New Coal Power

In 2007, Governor Tim Pawlenty signed the Next Generation Energy Act. This landmark legislation included Minnesota's Renewable Energy Standard – the nation's strongest at the time of passage – requiring 25% of Minnesota's electricity to come from renewable sources by the year 2025. The Act also included a requirement that no new coal



plants be built – or electricity from new coal plants imported into Minnesota – until a comprehensive carbon reduction plan was implemented in Minnesota. Three years later, no such plan has been implemented. However, legislation was introduced this year by Senator LeRoy Stumpf that would have permitted Minnesota to import electricity from new coal plants outside of the state without implementation of a carbon reduction plan. Late in the 2010 session, an amendment to the same effect was offered on the Senate floor by Senator Julie Rosen. A vote in the negative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The amendment failed 29-34. (SF2971, 03/24/2010)

### 5. PACE/Local Energy Financing

The Sierra Club actively supported legislation introduced by Senator John Doll to allow local governments (cities or counties) to provide public financing for energy projects for individual property owners (residential or commercial) that is then repaid via an assessment on that owner's property taxes. More commonly known as PACE, or "Property Assessed Clean Energy", this innovative public financing mechanism is now

in place in 21 states around the country. Now that PACE legislation has been passed in Minnesota, ensuring implementation of this new financing tool is an important challenge facing the Club and its allies in the near future. A vote in the affirmative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The bill passed 56-11. (SF2720, 03/29/2010)

### 6. Green Chemistry

Green chemistry refers to "the design of chemical products and processes that reduce or eliminate the use or generation of hazardous substances" (source: US EPA). Here in Minnesota, the Sierra Club supported legislation that was introduced by Senator Scott Dibble to include green chemistry within Minnesota's definition of "green economy". This change allows companies working the green chemistry field to have greater access to Minnesota's economic development programs. A vote in the affirmative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The bill passed 52-15. (SF2490, 03/29/2010)

# HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS



## 1. Use of CWLL Funds for OHV's

Representative Tom Hackbarth introduced an amendment the House floor to allow Legacy funds to be spent on trail repair and maintenance for ATV and snowmobile trails. This would have diverted money for non-motorized trails such as hiking and bicycle trails on public lands. A vote in the negative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The amendment passed 70-59. (HF1231, 05/08/2009)

## 2. Inaugural Legacy Appropriations

In 2008, Minnesota voters overwhelmingly approved the Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment. The Amendment provided for nearly \$300 million annually in dedicated funding to support clean water, protect habitat and natural areas, and invest in our parks, trails and cultural legacy. During the 2009 session, Minnesota Legislators passed the first bill to appropriate revenue from the Legacy Amendment. Environmental advocates worked hard to ensure that this first, precedent-setting bill would remain true to the intent of the constitutional language and the voters who approved it: that the new money would supplement and not supplant existing sources of revenue for natural resource programs. On the whole, the 2009 legislation was successful on this front. A vote in the affirmative was the position supported by the

Sierra Club. The bill passed 103-31. (HF1231, 05/18/2009)

## 3. ARRA Appropriations

Early in 2009, President Obama signed the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act into law. This law included, among many other items, significant investments in energy projects and energy infrastructure. Minnesota received approximately \$300 million of this money, much of which was directed to low-income weatherization projects and other State Energy Program projects. The appropriations bill for this money was introduced by Representative Jeremy Kalin. A vote in the affirmative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The bill passed 114-19. (SF657, 04/29/2009)

## 4. Nuclear Moratorium Repeal

In 1994, Minnesota passed a moratorium on the construction of new nuclear reactors. At that time, the Legislature cited unresolved issues related to the storage and disposal of nuclear waste, citing for new plants, transportation of hazardous waste, security and safety concerns, and high capital costs as reasons supporting this decision. Sixteen years later, the same issues remain unresolved in Minnesota and around the country. Yet some legislators still felt compelled in both 2009 and 2010 to pursue a repeal of Minnesota's

longstanding moratorium law. In 2009, the issue came to a straight up or down vote on the House floor when Rep. Tim Faust offered an amendment to an energy policy omnibus bill. A vote in the negative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The amendment failed 60-72. (SF550, 04/30/2009)

### **5. Remove CTS Study**

In 2009, the Sierra Club worked with our partners to support Rep. Frank Hornstein’s Building Sensible Communities legislation. This legislation included a variety of policy solutions designed to help communities plan their growth in a more sustainable way, reduce unnecessary transportation costs and transportation related pollution, and allow greater flexibility for local planners to plan for the needs of their community. An important provision authorizing the University of Minnesota’s Center for Transportation Studies to develop land use and planning strategies for local governments to reduce vehicle miles traveled and greenhouse gas emissions was included in the 2009 omnibus transportation budget bill. Representative Tom Emmer introduced an amendment on the House floor that would have redirected the appropriation away from this report. A vote in the negative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The amendment failed 57-74. (HF1309, 04/25/2009)

### **6. Carbon Plan Requirement for New Coal Power**

In 2007, Governor Tim Pawlenty signed the Next Generation Energy Act. This landmark legislation included Minnesota’s

Renewable Energy Standard – the nation’s strongest at the time of passage – requiring 25% of Minnesota’s electricity to come from renewable sources by the year 2025. The Act also included a requirement that no new coal plants be built – or electricity from new coal plants imported into Minnesota – until a comprehensive carbon reduction plan was implemented in Minnesota. Three years later, no such plan has been implemented. However, legislation was introduced this year by Representative Dave Olin that would have permitted Minnesota to import electricity from new coal plants outside of the state without implementation of a carbon reduction plan. Although that legislation did not advance in 2010, there were other attempts to weaken or eliminate the existing law offered as floor amendments, including an amendment by Representative Tom Hackbarth that would have removed the carbon plan requirement completely and allowed new coal plants to proceed in Minnesota. A vote in the negative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The amendment failed 58-74. (SF2971, 05/06/2010)

### **7. PACE/Local Energy Financing**

Representative Jeremy Kalin introduced legislation to allow local governments (cities or counties) to provide public financing for energy projects for individual property owners (residential or commercial) that is then repaid via an assessment on that owner’s property taxes. More commonly known as PACE, or “Property Assessed Clean Energy,” this innovative public financing mechanism is now in place in 21 states around the country. Enabling legislation for PACE was ultimately included in the omnibus jobs bill carried by Rep. Ann Lenczewski, but Rep. Steve Drazkowski introduced an amendment to remove PACE from the bill. A vote in the negative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The amendment failed 40-92. (HF2695, 03/29/2010)

### **8. Complete Streets**

Increasingly, Minnesotans are exploring and using modes of transportation beyond their automobile. As walking, bicycling and transit use continue to rise throughout the state, Minnesota needs to do a better job of ensuring that transportation planning accounts for all users and all modes of transportation – ensuring a safer transportation experience for everyone. The Sierra Club, along with many partners in the Minnesota Complete Streets Coalition, supported legislation to do exactly

that. The bill, introduced by Rep. Mike Obermueller and supported by a bipartisan slate of co-authors, requires the Minnesota Department of Transportation to implement a Complete Streets policy at the state level. A vote in the affirmative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The bill passed 92-37. (HF2801, 04/21/2010)

### 9. Weaken Environmental Review

Minnesota's environmental review statutes exist to ensure that government actions - including the approval of projects such as new mining, timber harvesting, or construction projects on public land - only proceed after a thorough review of the environmental impacts and potential mitigation needs and options associated with the project. These laws represent the bedrock of environmental policy in the state of Minnesota. In 2010, Representative Dean Urdahl introduced an amendment to severely scale back Minnesota's environmental review safeguards and limit the ability of state agencies to conduct thorough and adequate reviews. A vote in the negative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The amendment failed 53-76. (SF3275, 05/10/2010)

### 10. Cottage Grove Hazardous Waste Incinerator

The only hazardous waste incinerator in the state of Minnesota is located in Cottage Grove and is operated by 3M Corporation.

3M is currently seeking an amended permit from the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency that would allow it to incinerate waste not generated by the company itself, which it is not presently allowed to do. Community leaders have objected to this process due to public health concerns. Representatives Torrey Westrom and Paul Gardner introduced an amendment to the omnibus environment budget bill to remove language that would have imposed a one year moratorium on the MPCA's issuance of a new permit. A vote in the negative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The amendment failed 53-76. (SF3275, 05/10/2010)

### 11. Solar Rebate Program

Once the undisputed leaders in renewable energy development, the United States has been falling further and further behind in the race to capture the rapidly growing industry. Here in Minnesota, despite abundant wind and solar resources and the presence of an aggressive state renewable energy standard, Minnesota's renewable energy manufacturing sector remains small. Representative Tom Rukavina introduced legislation to establish a rebate program for consumers who purchase solar panels manufactured in Minnesota. In the few months since passage of this legislation, at least one new solar manufacturer has now announced plans to set up shop in the state. A vote in the affirmative was the position supported by the Sierra Club. The bill passed 98-33. (HF3033, 05/06/2010)
